Before being taken to the Volunteer Hospital the man said he was Edward Einfurrer, 35 years old, a clerk, living at 37 Seventy-second Street, Brooklyn. He attempted to end his life, he said, because persistent pains in the head because persistent pains in the had been troubling him for some time. Dr. Marone, who took him to the hospital, said Einfurrer was in a critical condition from shock and submersion. If he recovers he will be charged with attempted suicide.

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
