

SAN DIEGO, Cal., May 26.—“Neither man nor beast has ever been known to have been strangled by a Jew,” says a letter written to the Governor of Georgia by the Rev. Alfred K. Glover, rector of St. James’s Episcopal Church here. The letter urges that Leo M. Frank probably is innocent of the murder of Mary Phagan.

“The Jewish law and custom that compels, under pain of sin, the drawing of life blood of all animals to be slaughtered has also unconsciously applied from the time of Moses to the present to the criminal act of Jewish murderers as a kind of second nature,” the letter asserts. The writer is said to be a recognized authority upon laws and customs of the Jews.
