MORE DETECTIVES ARE PUT OUT TO ASSIST POLICE IN SOLVING PHAGAN MYSTERY

Solicitor General Dorsey Engages Private Sleuths to Run Down Clues Not As Yet Fully Developed--Grand Jury May Consider Mystery.

Solicitor General Hugh M. Dorsey this afternoon engaged private detectives to run down clues which have not as yet been fully developed by the men already working on the Phagan case.

These detectives are to investigate certain phases of the mystery which have previously received little attention, and which, he thinks may be of importance.

Mr. Dorsey had conferences to-day with the city detectives and with Miss Hattie Barnett, the investigator who has been in charge of the case.

It would not be surprising if the grand jury met this morning and considered only routine matters. The Phagan case was not taken up at all.

The report that the National Guard had been mobilized originally was questioned some of the officers of the 5th Regiment.

It is not beyond the bounds of possibility that the grand jury will be called on about six weeks before anything definite was found out.

Following Every Clue. "And why should the public demand such great haste? It requires weeks and months to solve a case of this kind."

Next Facts in Case. The Phagan case was this afternoon the subject of a meeting of the grand jury.

First--The coroner's inquest is not yet held. It has been adjourned until Monday afternoon next, and until it is ended the State is not likely to take hold of the case.

Miner Asks for Calmness. Deputy Sheriff Peabody says that the following plan for the coroner's inquest is being considered.

Every possible effort is being made to get the case cleared up as quickly as possible. The grand jury will be called on about six weeks before anything definite was found out.

COLUMBIA, S. C., May 2.--The transparent, tight or abnormally short of present-day fashions attracted by women that tends too strongly toward exhibiting the figure of the wearer is regarded as a "minister, persuasive, inciting evil influence," by Governor Blease, who today issued a signed interview championing dress reform.

It fears that the modern fashions will have a demoralizing effect on the young men of the South by "seeing the high regard for the virtue and purity and modesty of our womanhood which has been characteristic especially of the true men of the South."

The young woman of the South, says Governor Blease, should stand before a mirror and have her reflection of some near woman relative inspect her clothing before going on the streets.

The Governor wishes women's clubs and similar organizations to at once take up the matter of dress reform, and he is in favor of it.

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CHECK FOR \$400 SHOWN AT FIRE DEPARTMENT INQUIRY BY AGENT ACCUSING CHIEF

R. E. Davidson Drew Bank Order, and Cashied It Himself Shortly Before Date On Which He Says He Paid the Money to Cummings.

R. E. Davidson, agent for the Webb Motor Company, introduced a \$400 check before the councilman investigating committee some time ago, that he had paid this amount to Fire Chief Cummings in return for the Chief's influence.

Davidson's check was drawn on himself and cashied by himself at the Fourth National Bank. It was dated April 25, shortly prior to the time he has alleged he paid the money to Chief Cummings.

Davidson also showed the stub from which the check was taken. The stub showed that this was the only time an amount of money as great as \$400 had been drawn.

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BANDIT SHOOTS MILLIONAIRE IN TRAIN HOLD-UP

Robber Boards Car in Kansas City Union Depot—Escapes With \$15,000 Loot.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 2.—A millionaire and a family were wounded in a pistol duel on Kansas City Southern train No. 8, early today during the robbery of passengers.

The train was just getting out of the depot when a tall man ran out of the darkness of the railroad yards and climbed up the steps of the observation car. He had a handkerchief over the lower part of his face and carried two pistols.

Cesar Allen, a negro porter, who saw him board the train, rushed out and ordered him to get off.

Makes Negro Help Him The robber never hid his face, but he was seen to be nervous.

"I'm going to put over a trick here," he said to the porter. "If you will you go down there and be quiet."

After the train had proceeded about three miles the robber ordered Allen to go ahead of him through the train.

In the sitting room of the observation car were W. J. Sears, of New City Springs, Ark., the robber's valet, and E. A. Seaman, of Eureka Mo., who had offered no resistance when they saw him board the train.

"Give me your money," the robber demanded in a whisper as the shock of the train.

200 Witnesses to Be Called When Inquest Into Slaying of Factory Girl is Resumed Next Monday--Detectives Are Busy.

Coroner Declares Inquiry Will Not Be Made Thoroughly--Every Clue To Be Probed Thoroughly, Lee and Frank Are in Tower.

Grand Jury Meets, but Considers Only Routine Matters--Was No Truth in Report That Militia Had Been Ordered to Mobilize.

There were no developments of importance in the Phagan case to-day. This does not mean that the detectives and police force are not hard at work on the mystery. They are.

The report that the National Guard had been mobilized originated because Adjutant-General Nease requested some of the officers of the Fifth Regiment to be within call in case of trouble.

Coroner Donohoe said to a Georgian reporter that the mystery which surrounds the killing of Mary Phagan is by no means solved, and that the investigation would be carried on as long as there is a thread of evidence to be unraveled.

HUFF PROMISES RED-HOT ATTACK ON JUDGE SPEER

To Print 10,000 Copies of Pamphlet-Giving His Side of the Bankruptcy Case.

SEQUEL TO COURT'S ACTION

"There Will Be Something Doing Outside of the Usual," Says Macon Man.

MACON, GA., May 2--In a statement to the public today, W. A. Huff, whose \$185,000 estate had been pending in the bankruptcy court for eighteen years, and who had been appointed trustee by Judge Emory Speer, announces that just as soon as the papers can be filed up, he will distribute to the public another letter addressed to Judge Speer, in which he will attack that jurist as a man and an official.

Quiet Neighborly "Tease" In this connection I beg to call attention to the fact that for nearly fourteen years the newspapers, the Lawyers and the Federal court officials of Macon have baited themselves, in keeping the Huff case well advertised and that during all these years neither Huff nor Speer has been able to get the case out of court.

It is also proper for me to state that only a portion of my letter to the Judge was published by the papers at the time. The balance of the letter, together with all other communications, will now be placed before the public in pamphlet form.

My Time Has Arrived. "My time to head from has fully arrived by the subject in hand my friends and I are ready to go."

For sending the letter to Judge Speer last year Colonel Huff is now under a contempt of court charge. That letter was the most severe indictment of Judge Speer as a man and as a Judge. For several months Colonel Huff has been collecting evidence which he says he intends to use in impeachment proceedings against Judge Speer.

Practically all of his charges will be embodied in this pamphlet, 10,000 copies of which he says will be printed.

DEATH RATE FROM PHTHISIS LOWER

Census Report Shows Decrease in Three Years—Violent Deaths and Suicides Increase.
WASHINGTON, May 2.—In a bulletin made public today by Census Director Durand regarding the causes of death for the registration area only of the United States for 1911, the total deaths from all forms of tuberculosis is given as 94,099, or 16.8 per cent of the population.
The rate for 1910 was 16.63 and for the year 1909 was 16.47. The death rate for the past three years has been considerably lower than those of the preceding five years.
A marked increase, however, is shown in the number of suicides and deaths by violence.
The total number of suicides, says the report, for 1911 was 8,822, an increase of 1,032 over 1910. The death rate, however, increased only from 15 to 16.2 per 100,000 and was lower than that for 1909 or 1908.
The death rate of males from suicides, 14.5, was higher than that of females, 13.8. The highest suicide death rate was in California, 20.4; Montana, 21.3; Colorado, 21.7; among the big cities, San Francisco, 20.4; St. Louis, 17.7; New York, 17.2; Denver, 16.3.
Of the 44,628 deaths in 1911 classified as violent deaths (excluding accidents) more than nine-tenths, 39,121, were of an accidental or undetermined character, the remainder being due to homicide. The death rate from accidents and unspecified violence was 11.6 per 100,000, slightly higher than in 1910, 11.52, and lower than the rate in 1909, 11.42, and 1908, 11.32. The death rate of males from accidents, 11.7, was higher than that of females, 11.2. The highest accident death rate was in California, 19.1; or 4.8 per 100,000. The big cities were San Francisco, 19.1; New York, 18.7; Chicago, 18.7; St. Louis, 18.7; Denver, 18.7; and Boston, 18.7.

200 TO TESTIFY AT INQUEST IN PHAGAN DEATH

The transfer of the men's names to the work of the detective has been delayed, which had been expected for a long time. In the information, George Phagan was informed of important evidence that had not yet been presented and which still was in an unexplained state. It was his opinion that the greatest of his investigation should best be served by postponing further questioning of witnesses until Monday.

Girl Not on Streets After Noon

The result of the last 24 hours of the work of the detective has been to prove quite conclusively that Mary Phagan was not seen on the streets of Atlanta either in the heart of the city or near her home, after noon Saturday when she went to the pencil factory to obtain her pay envelope.

A half dozen persons were on hand soon after the death of the girl to testify that they had seen her at some place another at some time after she was known to have gone into the factory.

Their stories, collected so carefully, with the probabilities of the case that the story of each man was run down carefully by the detective who gave them when time to this phase of the investigation.

In each case the witness was found either positively or quite probably to be mistaken in his or her statement, or unable to go back to their original sources that they could leave the building after drawing her pay.

To all in the investigation, Thomas H. Heiler, member of the law firm of Heiler, Anderson, Dixon & Williams has been engaged to assist the Solicitor General in the prosecution of the case. From the law school community in which was the dead girl's home.
