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

MORE THAN HALF OF SHRINE VOTE PLEDGED FOR ATLANTA; BOOSTERS SURE OF VICTORY

DALLAS, TEXAS, May 12.—Atlanta now claims, as pledged, 250 of the 460 votes in the Imperial Council for the 1914 meeting place. Memphis still is alive and the fight has seemingly narrowed down to the two cities.

If Atlanta should lose the committee's recommendation the Georgians will carry the fight to the convention floor.

U. S. to Prosecute Firms Cutting Pay As Tariff Revenge

"They'll Land Behind Bars if They Try to Intimidate Congress," Says Senator Williams.

WASHINGTON, May 12.—The criminal clauses of the Sherman anti-trust act and the prosecuting powers of the Department of Justice will be used in defense of the reductions in duty prescribed by the Underwood tariff bill.

If combinations are found among employers to restrain trade and intimidate Congress by cutting wages and closing factory doors, criminal suits will be instituted.

This is the frank intimation of Senator John Sharp Williams, of the Senate Finance Committee.

The protected interests are coming to us with the same old plea that they are threatened with ruin, so Senator Williams says. "They threaten to cut wages or assert that it will be necessary to close them. This is plain, by intended to intimidate Congress. If it should be discovered the interests are combining for this purpose, the Sherman anti-trust act is sufficient to head to cover such acts and we need not land any of these gentlemen behind bars."

ASSEMBLIES FACE SPLIT ON SOCIAL SERVICE

Objection to National Protestant Platform May Act as Bar to Presbyterian Merger.

By REV. CHARLES STELZLE. Will the Southern Presbyterian Assembly organically unite with the Presbyterian denomination and enter fraternal relationships with all other protestants?

This is the question which its commissioners probably will be compelled to answer at the Assembly in its session in Atlanta.

There is little doubt that the Southern Assembly will combine with the United Presbyterian Church, but it is possible that it will sever its connection with the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America.

The Federal Council, includes practically the combined Protestant forces of the United States, representing 30 different denominations which have a membership of 16,000,000.

One of the chief reasons given by those who favor the separation is their objection to the social service platform adopted by the Federal Council.

Platform of Council. Heretofore the platform of the Council to which exception has been taken: The church must stand:

1. For equal rights and complete justice for all men in all relations of life.

2. For the protection of the family by the single standard of purity; uniform divorce laws; proper regulation of marriage and proper housing.

3. For the fullest possible development for every child, especially by the provision of proper education and recreation.

4. For the abolition of child labor.

5. For such regulations of the conditions of toil for women as shall safeguard the physical and moral health of the community.

6. For the abatement and prevention of poverty.

7. For the protection of the individual and society from the social, economic and moral waste of the liquor traffic.

8. For the conservation of health.

9. For the protection of the worker from dangerous machinery, occupational diseases and mortality.

10. For the right of all men to the opportunity of self-maintenance, for safeguarding this right against encroachment of every kind, and for the protection of workers from the hardships of enforced unemployment.

11. For suitable provision for the old age of the workers, and for those incapacitated by injury.

12. For the right of employees and employers alike to organize for adequate means of conciliation and arbitration in industrial disputes.

13. For a release from employment one day in seven.

14. For the gradual and reasonable reduction of the hours of labor to the lowest practicable point, and for that degree of limitation for which is a condition of the highest human life.

15. For a living wage as a minimum in every industry, and for the highest wage that each industry can afford.

16. For a heavy emphasis upon the application of Christian principles to the acquisition and use of property, and for the most equitable division of the product of industry that can ultimately be devised.

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NEW THEORY IS OFFERED IN PHAGAN MYSTERY

Detectives Not Centering All Their Efforts on Frank and Leo Now.

Detectives in the Phagan mystery are not centering all their efforts upon Frank and Leo. New theories have been advanced, new clues examined and every possible theory is being investigated.

It was because of these rumors on the streets today that a report was spread that an entirely new lead was being followed by Solicitor Dobney that might eliminate both Frank and Leo.

Solicitor Dobney said very little atention to the reports.

"There are no developments so far," he said, "which would tend to avert the prosecution from its present course."

The cases of the two men had not been placed before the Grand Jury as soon as the evidence against them can be properly shaped, unless other developments justify a change.

New Theory Investigated. The new theory alluded to has been submitted by a private detective employed by the Solicitor's office.

The man, whose identity has not been revealed, has been working along lines entirely at variance from those pursued by the prosecutor.

Mr. Dobney stated that while as yet no evidence had been produced to substantiate the proposed addition, that his investigations have taken the matter up and will go to the bottom of it. Every available means will be used to prove or disprove the detective's theory.

An important affidavit was added Tuesday to the great mass of evidence already collected by Solicitor Dobney.

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H. M. Flagler Dying; Plans for Funeral Already Under Way

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., May 12.—Word was received here this afternoon from West Palm Beach that Henry M. Flagler is rapidly growing weaker and is now unable to take nourishment. Arrangements for the funeral are being made in St. Augustine. He is not expected to live through the day.
