

DANIELS SCORES CHIEF SAYS LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS IMPROVE CRUSADE

Secretary Tells Navy Cadets Officer is Traitor Who Resigns From the Service.

ANNAPOLIS, Md., June 6.—(By Associated Press.) Secretary of the Navy, Josephus Daniels today made a speech at the commencement exercises of the Naval Academy...

"I have no sympathy for the arguments in favor of hanging," declared Daniels. "There is more worth considering. Let me appeal to you to take the lead of the American legislators in stamping out this barbarous practice from our schools...

"While there is no doubt that the chief of being good men who drink temperately, there is only one safe course for the young men who would abstain from intoxicating drinks."

"Touching on the practice of some naval officers retaining their position to go into the commercial world, Daniels said:

"The United States does not educate naval cadets for the purpose of supplying trained men for the industry of the country...

Every principle of honor, faith and self-respect is taught in the academy and no officer is permitted to accept a free education from his industrial connections...

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PINKERTON'S IN PAINTER CASE

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INSURANCE MURDER ARE PAINTING REPORT OF BALTIMORE CHEMISTS

By COLE E. MORGAN.

JACKSONVILLE, June 5.—Every step in clearing up the Painter insurance mystery now hangs on the reports of chemical and pathological analysis of Painter's vital organs by Baltimore chemists, and to-day matters are at a standstill at the Jackson,ville end. Neither the Coroner, insurance agents, the family nor the E. O. Painter Fertilizer Company is making a move, and none is in prospect until Baltimore is heard from. A veil of secrecy seems to shroud developments in Baltimore.

Painter's will was recorded for probate late this afternoon. It is a veiled document that gives no estimate as to the actual value of the estate left by the fertilizer manufacturer, who on May 22, lost his life in the St. Johns river, under mysterious circumstances. Less than \$2,000 in special bequests are specified; the remainder of the estate going to the widow and daughter who are named as joint administrators.

Of the special bequests, \$18,000 goes to relatives during their lifetime, they to receive the income only, the property to remain in the control of his daughter and to revert to her upon her death. The other bequests are in the interest of horticultural, education and church and charitable purposes, except that each employee of one or more shall receive one month's salary at vacation time.

The will was probated before Judge H. B. Phillips, county judge, after the widow, daughter and their attorney, S. P. Williams, returned to be Miss Painter's fiancé, had visited the court house together and inhaled as the procedure necessary. The application for probate was signed by Mrs. Martha S. Painter, the widow and Miss Olin Painter, his daughter.

Drawn Over Year Ago.
The first clause covers all his estate in then except amounts that are specified further on in the document. The will was drawn up in 1911, and was witnessed by Madge Wilkerson and W. L. Lyman. Council Asks For Voted of People On Bond Issue

Two resolutions touching the issuance of bonds—One of which grew out of the emergency declaration interdicting the city of Atlanta from purchasing on credit, the other arising from a desire to make all bond issues easier from a legal standpoint—were passed unanimously by the General Council of Atlanta late this afternoon.

The first resolution came from the Finance Committee, upon whose shoulders was placed the task of providing \$250,000 to purchase the crematory. It provided that the Mayor Pro Tem appoint a committee to investigate the question of levying bonds for schools, water, sewers and street and hospital improvements.

The second resolution, introduced by Judge John S. Candler, Alderman, requested Atlanta's Representatives in the Legislature to submit a proposal to the vote of the people permitting municipalities to issue bonds upon a two-thirds vote of the voters in the local election.

Both resolutions were passed without a dissenting voice, and without debate.

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COOK DENIES AFFIDAVIT GIVEN OUT BY GOLICE

Utter repudiation of the affidavit which she was alleged to have sworn to in criminal proceedings in the home of Leo M. Frank, indicted for the slaying of Mary Phagan, was made Thursday by Minola McKnight, negro cook for the accused factory superintendent and his wife's parents.

The woman denies absolutely every statement attributed to her by the police, and denies that she even signed the paper made public by the police.

The Georgian presented the McKnight affidavit to its readers with the distinct admission that it must not be accepted as credible evidence until passed on in a court of law. The affidavit was so full of strange inaccuracies and the need for some explanation was so apparent that a further investigation was decided upon.

The cook's statement, giving the case a new and startling turn, is therefore presented just as the police affidavit was for what it is worth and no evidence. It is an utter and absolute repudiation of the affidavit printed Wednesday and which purported to have been signed and sworn to by her.

She denied unequivocally that she had made the startling statements in the alleged affidavit which might send Leo Frank to the gallows could their truth be established beyond a doubt.

No member of the Frank family was about to influence her replies in any manner. McKnight, however, furnished another sensation by declaring that he never had heard his wife say anything which he is reported to have told at the hardware shop of Beck & Gregg, and which resulted in her grilling.

She repudiated the alleged affidavit as a whole and in detail. She made her denials willingly and emphatically. There was no hesitation in her replies. Her first comment on the alleged affidavit constituted a complete and absolute denial of its truth.

ACCUSED MAN'S WIFE MAKES FIRST PUBLIC STATEMENT IN CASE

Following the complete denial by Minola McKnight, cook in the household of Leo M. Frank, of the statements she is alleged to have made in the sensational police affidavit given out Wednesday, Mrs. Leo M. Frank Thursday made her first public statement on the Mary Phagan mystery.

Mrs. Frank makes an eloquently pathetic defense of her husband and attacks Solicitor General Dorsey's methods in the securing of evidence, charging torture and a deliberate determination to distort facts.

Mrs. Frank denies absolutely that her husband in any way demanded himself so as to indicate he had been involved in a tragedy on the day Mary Phagan was slain or any other day. Here is Mrs. Frank's complete statement:

Editor The Georgian—Sir: The action of the Solicitor General in arresting and imprisoning our family cook because she would not voluntarily make a false statement against my innocent husband, brings a limit to patience. This wrong is not chargeable to a detective acting under the necessity of shielding his own reputation against attacks in newspapers, but of an intelligent, trained lawyer whose sworn duty it is to protect the innocent as well as to punish the guilty. My information is that this Solicitor has admitted that no crime is charged against this cook and that he had no legal right to have her arrested and imprisoned.

The following statement from The Atlanta Journal undertakes to give the history of the arrest: up to the time the woman was carried to the police station in the patrol wagon, weeping and shouting in a hysterical condition.

It is not surprising that my cook should sign an affidavit to relieve herself from torture that had been applied to her for four hours, according to The Atlanta Constitution, "to a point of exhaustion." It would be surprising if she would not, under such circumstances, give any statement.

This torturing process can be used to produce testimony to be published in the newspapers to prejudice the case of anyone the Solicitor favors. It is also valuable to prevent anyone stating facts unfavorable to the accused, because as soon as the Solicitor finds it out he can arrest the witness and apply the torture. It is hard to believe that practices of this nature will be countenanced anywhere in the world outside of Russia.
