GIVE BY NEGRO

Admissions to Prosecutor's Aid Strengthens Rumor That He Saw Girl Just Before Crime.

Frank A. Hooper, associated with Solicitor Dorsey in the prosecution of Leo M. Frank on the charge of strangling Mary Phagan, admitted Saturday that Jim Conley, negro sweeper at the National Pencil Factory, had made important admissions to the story of his part in the murder which had had told of circumstances on the day of the crime which he had revealed in none of his previous statements.

A persistent rumor that Conley had made the startling admission that he had seen Mary Phagan enter the factory on the day she was slain arose at the time the negro was questioned more than an hour by Solicitor Dorsey early in the week, and this rumor was heightened after Attorney Hooper's interview with the negro Friday.

In all of his statements to the detectives Conley denied he saw the girl at all on the day of the crime until he was horrified by the sight of her dead body lying in the rear of the second floor where he was directed by Leo Frank, Solicitor Dorsey, to go and see the body. The statement from him that he did see Mary Phagan when she came in the door of the factory and went to the second floor to Frank's office.

Mr. Hooper refused to affirm or deny this report, declaring that his connection with the case was so recent that he would not be warranted in making any definite statement for publication in reference to this evidence in the possession of the prosecution.

His attention was called to the fact that while in all of the published statements of Conley the negro denied seeing Mary Phagan go into the factory, and puzzling features of the prosecution could now be induced to say that he still stuck to this particular and puzzling feature of the story, Mr. Hooper, however, would make no comment on the circumstance.

He contented himself with the general assertion that the State has a big stack of evidence of which the defense is in entire ignorance and of which they will remain in ignorance until it is presented when Frank is placed on trial for his life.

"I want to the police station yesterday merely for the purpose of having Conley rehearse his story," said Mr. Hooper. "It is true that he told me a number of circumstances of which I had been in ignorance before, circumstances which have a most important bearing on the case. He made additions to his story which, while they were along the same general line as his last affidavit, gave a detail that assisted me remarkably in getting a much clearer idea of the events as they happened on that day."

Will Be Revealed at Trial.

"I can not tell what they were. They will be revealed when the trial is in actual progress. Mr. Dorsey has guarded his evidence carefully and has refrained from trying his case in the papers. If it were not presumptuous for me to try and give this evidence away to the public and to let the jury know it would be at least, most unwise."

The negro appeared to be telling a straightforward story. He said that it caused me to alter my theory of the killing in the least. So far as I know, there never has been any serious doubt that those were blood-stains there on the second floor. I am confident that it was there that the attack was made. I questioned Conley only occasionally, preferring to let him speak and tell his story in his own way. Only when some point puzzled me for a moment did I stop him for an explanation."

Mr. Hooper said Solicitor Dorsey had been confident that the negro's story was true, and that he had been extremely difficult in fact, the element of "reasonable doubt."

Great Array of Finger-Print and Blood-Stain Students Will Give Their Views.

The trial of Leo M. Frank will bring forth the most prominent array of criminal and medical experts ever grouped in a Southern court room.

This became known Saturday when Solicitor Hugh M. Dorsey began making preparations to have the skilled investigators who have worked in the Phagan case return to Atlanta for the trial.

The defense has not been idle and is prepared to show an expert on almost every conceivable angle to introduce in rebuttal.

Fingerprint experts were brought into the case almost immediately after it was taken from the hands of the police by Solicitor Dorsey.

Important role will be played by the experts on blood stains.

The state's case rests almost entirely on its ability to prove the blood found on the second floor of the pencil factory was the blood of Mary Phagan.

Another point on which experts will be asked to testify will be as to the flow of blood after the fatal stroke.

Many other experts, not a few of them prominent physicians here and some from the great hospitals of the East, are to testify.

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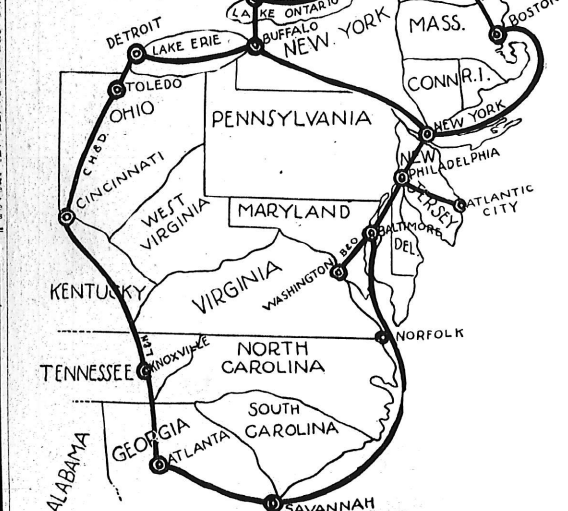

It evidently is the purpose of the State to hold Conley off of indictment, pending the disposition of the charges against Frank. His status as a material witness appears much upon this course.

There always is a chance, however, that a grand jury may take up a bill of this sort of its own motion, and to that extent there remains the possibility of prior indictment hanging over Conley.

It seems more likely, however, that the case will go to trial about as it shapes up now.

It does not indicate that the State really has any further apprehension of particularly effective thing up its sleeve. Neither do I think the defense has.

There may be, on both sides, bits of corroborated evidence or evidence to offset that, or the other to come out in the main, I think the public is in possession of all the essential facts.

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Order Has at Last Been Rested and Indications Are That Struggle of Attorneys Will Be Waged in the Most Ethical Manner.

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As deplorable as the Phagan case, in all its melancholy details, it already is evident enough that there will come at it eventually much that the community may be thankful for.

In the first place, Atlanta and Georgia, and incidentally the entire South, will have learned a good lesson in law and order, justice and fair play, and to that extent may be the better prepared for the next case of the kind that comes to their attention.

In the second place, there will be the future no such wretched bumbling and frenzied appeal in and from police headquarters, as for a time marked the Phagan case, unique among its kind.

It looks now as if the decks have been pretty well cleared for action and that Leo Frank's trial may be expected to proceed in dignity and order, and that in its final analysis the death of Mary Phagan's murder may be established, at least to the extent of Frank's real or suspected participation therein.

If Frank should be convicted, that would mean the subsequent indictment and conviction of the negro Conley as an accessory after the fact.

Conley indictment may follow. If Frank should be found not guilty, that would mean the indictment of Conley as principal in the murder, in all human probability.

It evidently is the purpose of the State to hold Conley free of indictment, pending the disposition of the charges against Frank. He stands as a material witness depends much upon this course.

There always is a chance, however, that a Grand Jury may take up a thing of this sort, if the case remains to that extent there remains the possibility of prior indictment having been returned.

It seems more likely, however, that the case will go to trial about as it shows up now.

I do not incline to think the State seeks any further sensational or particularly effective thing, save a conviction. Neither do I think the case has been brought to this point to possession of all the essential facts.

It is feared that these Senators will certainly support the Chamberlain resolution providing for a constitutional amendment permitting women to vote; Ashurst and Smith, of Arizona; Thomas and Shafer, of Colorado; Rogers and Brand, of Michigan; Myers and Wain, of Montana; Gallagher and Hollis, of New Hampshire; Chamberlain and Lane, of Oregon; Clark and Suberster, of Utah; Jones and Pollock, of Wisconsin; Clark and Warren, of Wyoming; Jones and Owen, of Nevada; Handley and Thornton, of Louisiana.

The House has passed the bill in the lower house. It is possible that Senators Cummins, Kenyon, Sherman, Lewis, Eristow and Thompson may be added to the list, but they will be in the minority.
