

BIG FIGHT AT COUNCIL MEETING

CHIEF SEEKS POLICEMEN TO BE DISMISSED

Members of Force Belonging to
Locker Organizations Likely
To Be Dismissed.

A field investigation into the relations of the police and the locker clubs of Atlanta was begun Tuesday by Chief Beavers in connection with the police scandal probe.

Sergeant L. S. Bohbs was assigned to make a thorough examination of the locker club membership books, with instructions to ascertain the names of members of the police department who appear thereon, and report to him.

News and startling disclosures of corruption will be made in the course of the investigation, it is said by the chief.

Big shake-up is anticipated. Coming on the heels of the stories of disloyalty at the notorious Ochs Bradley resort in the rear of 113 Auburn Avenue, the investigation of the alliance between the policemen and the blind tigers and locker clubs are expected to presage a "big shake-up" in the ranks.

Text Books House
In Lower House

The first move in the school book fight, which is expected to prove the most important before the Legislature next to the tax reform proposition, was made Tuesday morning when Representative J. M. McQueen introduced a resolution calling for the appointment of a joint committee of both Houses to investigate the matter.

The object of the fight is to have the State publish its own school books and save the taxpayers nearly \$300,000 a year to the people. The resolution provides for a joint committee of three senators and five representatives, with authority to subpoena witnesses and make a complete investigation.

7,580 Postal Jobs

WASHINGTON, July 1.—How substantial and uninterrupted has been the record of the Postoffice Department under the management of Postmaster General Burleson is shown in a report given out today. In four months the Postmaster has given practically 7,580 jobs to the country, except some civil service fourth class men, being Democratic. This is at the rate of 1,932 a month, or 163 a day.
