With late developments indicating that Walter Turpin, the yeoman who checked the safe of the Kirkwood postoffice Friday night, is a "modern" cracksmen, who takes young boys under his wing and schools them in the ways of crime, the authorities of De Kalb County and Atlanta are securing the country to capture two boys said to have served as lookouts while Turpin fled the charges of burglary.

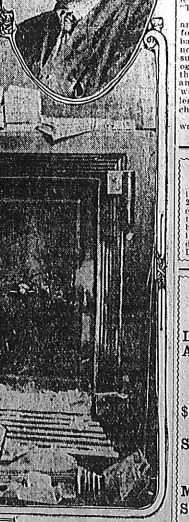

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COCHRAN TO ASK INVESTIGATION OF SCHOOLS

Fulton Legislator Believes There Has Been Extravagance at the State Agricultural Colleges.

Satisfied that mismanagement, incompetency or extravagance may have been prevalent in the various district agricultural colleges of late, Representative Ralph O. Cochran, of Fulton, will propose a resolution in the House calling for a rigid legislative probe into the same.

Mr. Cochran's idea is that the schools as far have failed pointedly to justify the great outlay of money required to keep them up.

The gentleman from Fulton will not charge any person with deliberate wrongdoing, but he does believe that the schools have not been conducted in a businesslike manner, and that they might, and should, be placed on a basis working to Georgia's greater advantage.

He calls attention to the deficits shown in the Treasurer's reports, and draws the seemingly warranted inference that the colleges are not returning to the State anything like the value which is being paid for them.

The seven district schools are supposed to be self-supporting, in a way, but the reports, as indicated by the Treasurer's report, do not show them as approximating anything like actual status.

The proposed investigation, coming on the heels of the ink in the Experiment Station, is sure to attract widespread attention throughout Georgia as every congressional district has one of these agricultural schools.

Mr. Cochran does not wish to be placed in the attitude of attacking the district schools, said Mr. Cochran, discussing his resolution Monday. "I really wish their consideration in benefiting agricultural conditions in Georgia, and in trying to find out exactly what is going on, and what has been done, so that we can proceed as the reports indicate."

PLANTERS FIGHT TAX ON COTTON EXCHANGES

Declare Present Scheme Would Deliver Price-Making Power Into England's Hands.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Southern planters are protesting to the Senate Finance Committee against the provision in the tariff bill taxing cotton-exchange dealers 5 per cent.

The planters contend that with such a tax, amounting to about 30 cents a bale of cotton, no exchange can continue to do business. The planters are opposed to the New York Exchange and other Southern cotton exchanges to continue.

In this argument they present it is held that the New Orleans exchange, which has been in operation since 1850, is the only one of its kind in the South.

The New York Exchange is friendly to the Southern planter, but its purpose being to decrease the price of cotton. It makes no delivery, but serves the planter for their own use.

With the waning out of the cotton exchange in Liverpool and secure market price is fixed in Holland.

Following the news of the closing of the First National Bank, a study run started on the National Bank for Savings, which also is controlled by the same interests.

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Bill, in Both House and Senate, Provides for Supervisor of State Institutions.

A bill providing for the creation of a department of banking to regulate and supervise approximately 600 State banks in Georgia was presented Monday to the House and Senate Com-mittees on Banks and Banking by the Georgia Bankers' Association.

The bill, it is stated, will reorganize the method of supervision of State banks as well as take such supervision entirely from the hands of the State Comptroller and his assistants.

The present regulation and supervision is entirely inadequate, as it involves three men appointed to con- sider approximately 600 banks each year. Two assistants per year give each of them less than 100 inspections to make in the 365 days.

The proposed bill provides for the creation of a department of banking, which shall be in charge of a supervisor of the State banks, who shall be appointed by the Governor for a term of four years, the first term beginning January 1, 1918, and expiring January 1, 1919.

The bill provides for a salary of \$1,000 a year and shall have the power to appoint from time to time an assistant superintendent who shall be ex-officio manager and such additional examiners and office assistants as may be required to dis- charge the duties of the office.

The assistant superintendent and special examiners shall be skilled ac- counts and familiar with the bank- ing business. The assistant superin- tendent shall receive a salary of \$2,000 per annum, while each assistant shall receive a salary of \$1,800 per year.

Every bank, trust company, and other corporation doing a banking business in the State, including insur- ance banks, cooperative or voluntary banks, and banks of depositors, shall be subject to supervision by the State department.

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PLANTERS FIGHT CLOSING OF BANK INVOLVES 40 MILLIONS

Declare Present Scheme Would Deliver Price-Making Power Into England's Hands.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Southern planters are protesting to the Senate Finance Committee against the pro- vision in the tariff bill taxing cotton exchange dealers 85 per cent.

This provision was inserted in the tariff bill by Senator Simmons to meet the demand that there shall cease all trading in cotton futures and on margins. It resulted from attempts to corner the cotton market made by speculators on the New York Cotton Exchange.

The planters contend that with such a tax, amounting to about 60 cents a bale of cotton, no exchange can be maintained to do business. The planters are opposed to the New York Ex- change, but they want the New Or- leans and other Southern cotton ex- changes to continue.

With the wiping out of the cotton exchange in this country, the cotton market at Liverpool, which is the only market in the world, will take command of the cotton mar- ket and fix the price just as the sugar market price is fixed in London.

It is contended that through the proposed tax a great injustice will be done to the cotton growers who are now laboring under the difficulty of competition with Egyptian cotton, which is of high grade and commands a better price than Southern cotton.

Egyptian cotton, which needs but a little more water than the native kinds of cotton, is raised in the States of California, Arizona, and New Mexico, and is short on fiber.

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DEPARTMENT TO GOVERN BANKS PROPOSED

Bill, in Both House and Senate, Provides for Supervisor of State Institutions.

A bill providing for the creation of a department of banking to regulate and supervise approximately 600 State banks in Georgia was presented Monday to the House and Senate committees on Banking and Finance by the Georgia Bankers' Association.

The bill, if passed, will revolutionize the method of supervision of State banks as it will take such supervision entirely from the hands of the State Controller and his assistants.

Haynes McPhaden, secretary of the Georgia Bankers' Association, said Monday morning that he hopes for the bill to be passed, but that it would be presented to the House and Senate Banking Committee, which may do as they see fit.

Bill Called Good One.
"The bill is a good one, we think," said Mr. McPhaden, "and if passed will be a great benefit to the supervision of the State banks, which are now regulated by the State Controller and his assistants."

The present regulation and supervision is entirely inadequate, as is obvious when it is brought out that these three men are supposed to conduct examinations of approximately 600 banks each year. Two examinations per year are made to each of these men 600 inspections to make in 360 days.

The proposed bill provides for the creation of a department of banking, which shall be in charge of a superintendent appointed by the Governor for a term of four years, the first term beginning January 1, 1916, and expiring January 1, 1917.

The superintendent shall receive a salary of \$1,000 a year and shall have the power to appoint from time to time an assistant superintendent, who shall be an ex-officio examiner, and such additional examiners and office assistants as may be required to discharge the duties of the office.
