## SCOTT IS SUMMONED BY FRANK'S LAWYER

Chief Lanford Declares H. B. Pierce Has Not Kept Faith With His Department.

Harry Scott, the Pinkerton detective who planned the third degree which exacted the confession from Jim Conley, the negro sweeper, has been summoned by the defense in the coming Frank trial.

He was served with a subpoena yesterday from Frank's counsel. terday from Frank's counsel. At police ineadquarters in the atternoon he expressed belief that Chief Lanford, Detective John Black and others connected with the third degree which gained the negro's admission would also be summoned by the defense.

Frank's atterneys would make no formment upon this move. Chief Langer

comment upon this move. Chief Lan-ford and his men, however, say they have not yet received such summons.

In a lengthy interview Saturday afternoon, Chief Lanford denounced II. B. Pierce, general superintendent of the Atlanta Pinkerton forces, for alleged questionable procedure in Phagan investigation. When application was filed for permission to establish a branch in Atlanta, Lanford states that it was on condition that the Pinkertons work in harmony with police headquarters that the right was granted.

"The promise has been kept by all but Pierce," the detective head declared. He also intimated that the po-lice board will be requested to take

action.

"Detective Scott has carried out his contract with the police department," said Lanford, "and has turned over to us all evidence he and the men under his direct supervision have obtained. During his absence from the city re-cently, however, a bloody stick was found in the pencil factory, along with an envelope supposed to have Mary Phagan's.

"Neithor of these was turned over to the police, but their discovery was kept a secret white they rested in the hands of the defense. The finding of these clues, I am forced to presume, was done at the direction of Pierce. Ills action in keeping them secret is

an open breach of faith." Lanford also strongly hinted planted evidence in both the discovery of the envelope and bludgeon.
